- (10) 1. Find the absolute maximum and absolute minimum values of the function $f(x) = 3x^4 - 4x^3$ on the interval $[-1, 2]$.

$$f'(x) = 12x^3 - 12x^2$$

$$f'(x) = 0 : 12x^3 - 12x^2 = 0 \rightarrow 12x^2(x-1) = 0 \rightarrow x = 0, 1 \leftarrow \text{critical numbers in } (-1, 2)$$

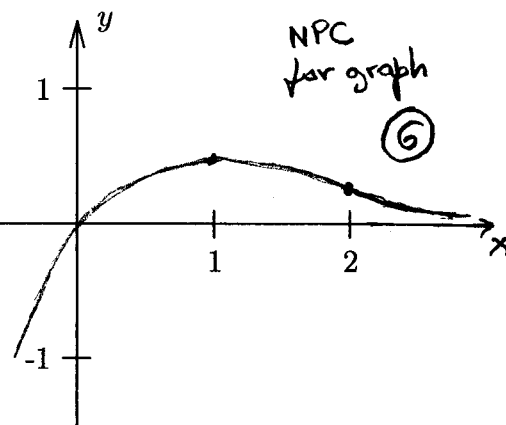

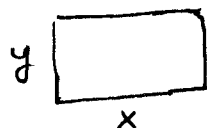

- (8) 8. Among all the rectangles with base x , height y , and perimeter 20 in, find the dimensions of the one with largest area. You must use Calculus.



$$A = xy$$

$$2x + 2y = 20 \rightarrow y = 10 - x$$

$$A = x(10 - x) \quad 0 \leq x \leq 10$$

$$\frac{dA}{dx} = 10 - 2x$$

$$\frac{dA}{dx} = 0 : 10 - 2x = 0 \quad x = 5$$

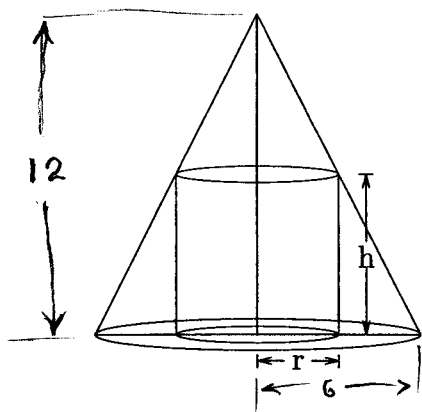
$$\text{When } x = 0 \text{ or } x = 10: A = 0$$

- (12) 9. A right circular cylinder is inscribed in a cone of height 12 in and base radius 6 in. Find the radius of such a cylinder with largest possible volume. (Let h denote the height and r the radius of the cylinder).



Let V denote the volume of the cylinder

$$V = \pi r^2 h \quad (2)$$

$$\frac{h}{6-r} = \frac{12}{6} \rightarrow h = 12 - 2r \quad (4)$$

$$V = \pi r^2 (12 - 2r) = 12\pi r^2 - 2\pi r^3 \quad 0 \leq r \leq 6$$

$$\frac{dV}{dr} = 24\pi r - 6\pi r^2 \quad (2)$$

$$\frac{dV}{dr} = 0 : 24\pi r - 6\pi r^2 = 0$$

$$6\pi r(4 - r) = 0$$

$$r = 0, r = 4$$

$$\text{When } r = 0: V = 0$$

$$\text{" } r = 6: V = 0$$

$$\text{" } r = 4: V = \pi 16(12 - 8) = 64\pi \text{ max}$$

- (12) 10. A particle is moving with acceleration $a(t) = t^2 + 3 \cos t$. Its initial position is $s(0) = 2$ and its initial velocity is $v(0) = 3$. Find the position function $s(t)$.

$$a(t) = t^2 + 3 \cos t$$

$$v(t) = \frac{t^3}{3} + 3 \sin t + C$$

$$\text{When } t = 0: 3 = 0 + 0 + C \rightarrow C = 3$$

$$v(t) = \frac{t^3}{3} + 3 \sin t + 3$$

$$s(t) = \frac{t^4}{12} - 3 \cos t + 3t + D$$

$$\text{When } t = 0: 2 = 0 - 3 + 0 + D \rightarrow D = 5$$

$$s(t) = \frac{t^4}{12} - 3 \cos t + 3t + 5$$
