Learning Resources

- **Textbook:** Calculus, Early Transcendentals, Third Edition by Briggs, Cochran, Gillett, and Schulz; published by Pearson.
- MyLabMath is required. Students will use it to do online homework and instructors will use it to record all the scores. Here is the [Student Guide to MyLabMath](#).
- There is a two-week grace period before you must purchase an access code.
- A digital version of the textbook (eText) is included in Pearson MyLabMath, and a hard copy of the textbook is not required.
- Students should access MyLabMath through their [Brightspace](#) page.
- Lecture materials, including notes and videos, may be accessed via the links provided in the Brightspace course calendar.
- Students are expected to check the Brightspace page and emails regularly for announcements.

Homework

- Online homework assignments are on MyLabMath and are accessed through the course Brightspace page.
- The online homework schedule is available in the course calendar.
- Except in cases of University approved reasons, late homework will not be accepted.

- Instructors should not assign or collect any assessments, including homework during the Quiet Period (Aug. 2nd–Aug. 4th).
- At the end of the semester, the lowest 5 online homework scores will be excused.

Quizzes

- There are a total of 10 online quizzes given via Gradescope. Please refer to the course calendar for the exact dates.
- You are supposed to do the quizzes on your own although quizzes do not require proctors. You are responsible for having a reliable device and a stable internet to take the quizzes. No extension will be given due to technical issues in general.
- You may take the quiz anytime within a 24-hour window, beginning at 1 PM on quiz day and ending at 1 PM the following day. Once opened, you will have 25 minutes to complete and submit your quiz. Each quiz is meant to take approximately 15 minutes to complete. An additional 10 minutes are allotted for submission. Also, There's no requirement to use the template PDF file for your answers.
- At the end of the semester, the two lowest quiz scores will be dropped.

Examinations

- There will be two, one-hour, midterm exams and a two-hour comprehensive final exam.
- All exams must be completed in person on Purdues campus or at an approved testing location.
 - If you take the exams at the West Lafayette campus administered by the Department of Mathematics, the dates, times, and locations will be posted on the course webpage later.
 - If you are taking the exams at testing centers, please make sure they are approved. Note that Purdue Testing Services (PTS) and testing centers certified by organizations such as [NCTA](#) are automatically approved. For other testing centers, please request approval.
